# SPANISH REDS RETAKE USERA IN HARD FIGHT

### Counter Attack By Madrid's Defenders Starts Offensive Drive

By JAN YINDRICH (United Press Staff Correspondent) Madrid, Dec. 28—(CP)—Government troops recaptured Usera in hard week-end fighting and prepared today to inaugurate the eighth week of the siege of Madrid by trying to drive a wedge toward Carabanchel Alto. Success of this maneuver would split the insurgents on a line between the Getafe area and the Boadilla-Ponzoledo front, and put loyalists in a strong strategic position to launch flank attacks on either side. Make Surprise Attack The government troops advanced about one mile on the Carabanchel-Barrio-Usiera sector as a result of the surprise attack Sunday, indicating preparations to take the offensive away from the insurgents are about to be translated into concrete action. A strong insurgent counter-attack passed the bridge across the Manzanares river, near the north station, was thrown back. Lasts Four Hours The battle for Usera took four hours. The attack began at a point in the Carabanchel sector known as El Basurero. An advance artillery barrage punished the insurgents severely, loyalist officers said. Troops directed by Colonel Mena occupied the extreme position on the right side. The advancing troops found several abandoned insurgent tanks. Loyalists sources said the Usera

### MELTING POT TO BE STIRRED

Honolulu—(CP)—Cultural heritages in Hawaii, often called the "real melting pot of America," will be extensively studied this year and the results published by University of Hawaii students under direction of Dr. Andrew W.
